Foreword

At the height of the Industrial Revolution the North West of England was a pioneering force in the industrialisation of the papermaking process, even exporting products and expertise to those countries where paper had originated, such as Japan. It is still one of the most important regions for the industry: it is home to the UK's largest paper mill, employs around one quarter of the UK's paper workforce and the paper industry in the North West is one of the most forward thinking industries in terms of recycling, energy conservation and the environment.

The 31 artists in *The First Cut* invite the viewer to radically re-think the possibilities of this basic material. Some hand-make their own paper from material such as seaweed and textile fibres, others use the detritus of the fast food industry, second hand books, vintage maps, currencies, basic office paper and, at the other end of the scale, high grade artist paper. In the hands of the artists this fragile material becomes a powerful means to articulate ideas and concepts that tackle issues as varied as globalisation, consumerism, geopolitical boundaries, the environment and race, as well as more personal concerns referencing depictions of the body, childhood and memory.

Truly global in reach, this exhibition features artists from America, Australia, Denmark, France, Germany, Italy, Japan, Sweden, Taiwan and the U.K., all working with paper in unique ways. We are delighted to be showing such a large body of new work, including seven large-scale new commissions and a number of other new artworks that have been created especially for *The First Cut*. Some artists have made work in response to the spaces at Manchester Art Gallery, which will be re-worked for our touring partner venues, Djanogly Art Gallery, Nottingham and Sea City Museum and Southampton City Art Gallery.

We have also included works that resonate with historic works from the Gallery's permanent collections: Susan Stockwell's interest in Imperial Britain is embodied

Papering the Body

The final theme of the exhibition is *Papering the Body*. The Gallery of Costume, located in the 18th century Platt Hall, features artists who create dresses and shoes from paper. Susan Stockwell's dresses from maps and money are showcased here while Susan Cutts uses her own handmade paper to fashion her dancer's outfit. Violese Lunn reveals the traces of a spine or organs inside her crumpled and ethereal outfits, positioned in a stuccoed interior alongside historic portraits of women. These unwearable garments all explore identity in different ways. Unlike a protective carapace, they resemble a ghostly skin, leaving a strong echo of the absent female body.

The diversity of artworks in *The First Cut* showcases the versatility and unpredictability of paper. From large scale, show stopping installations to miniature sculptures, the 31 international artists are committed to taking paper beyond its natural boundaries. By transforming books, magazines and maps, using silhouettes, creating dresses, sculptures and installations, the artists demonstrate the huge potential and power of such a humble material.

Susan Stockwell

Susan Stockwell transforms everyday materials, the ephemeral material culture present in our daily lives. She is concerned with issues of ecology, geo-politics, mapping, trade and global commerce. Paper sculptures with their delicate, disposal and fragile nature, are an important element of her practice.

Stockwell's series of dresses fashioned from maps, money, rice paper and coffee filters, use paper which has had a significant past use and history. Highland Dress 2010 has been created from Ordnance Survey maps of the Scottish Highlands referencing the English occupation of Scotland for over 300 years. The juxtaposition of military maps with a woman's dress sends a powerful message of the gendered nature of war and politics being traditionally dominated by men. Colonial Dress 2008, made from world maps, with its bustle, collar, ruffs and rose detail, immediately transports us to an age of Empire and Britain's Imperial past. Colourful bank notes from all over the world are stitched together to form Money Dress 2010, based on the floor length and puff sleeved style of dress worn in the 1870s by British female explorers. Sited in the historic galleries at Manchester Art Gallery and the Gallery of Costume, Platt Hall, the dresses are in dialogue with the collection and architecture, cementing their relationship with history.

Susan Stockwell was born in 1962 and lives and works in London. Stockwell originates from Manchester and studied at the Royal College of Art, London. She has exhibited in galleries and museums all over the world, including the V&A, London and The National Museum of China, Beijing. She has been awarded scholarships, grants and commissions such as a Visiting Arts Taiwan-England Artists Fellowship, an Arts and Humanities Research Council Grant and has recently completed a large public commission for the University of Bedfordshire. She has taken part in residencies and projects in Europe, America, Australia and Asia.
